All modal verbs have some special characteristics you should remember: 1 they do not take an -S in the third person singular: you cannot say he cans or she wills 2 they are followed by an infinitive without 'to' in most cases, except OUGHT TO Ex: You ought to study more more if you want to pass the exam

number of so-called semi-modal verbs, including the necessity modal have-to (that is, have taking a to-infinitive complement) This semi-modal has largely displaced must in many syntactic contexts in modern usage, most notably in order to convey modal necessity at a past time (since must lacks a past-tense form), as well as in non-finite contexts

Modals of Possibility and Certainty: MAY, MIGHT, COULD ...

- There can only be one modal in a verb group For the purposes of questions and negations, the modal auxiliary is “the” auxiliary • We may use modals of possibility and certainty to talk about the future, and sometimes MAY, MIGHT and COULD can be used indiscriminately: “It may / might / could rain later”

Modal verbs Modal verbs (also called modal auxiliary verbs) express a variety of attitudes (“moods”) towards a possible action or state the lexical verb refers to They are used to express meaning connected with the ideas of ability, obligation, freedom to act and opportunity, and to assess the likelihood of events, Modal verbs convey two main areas of meaning
